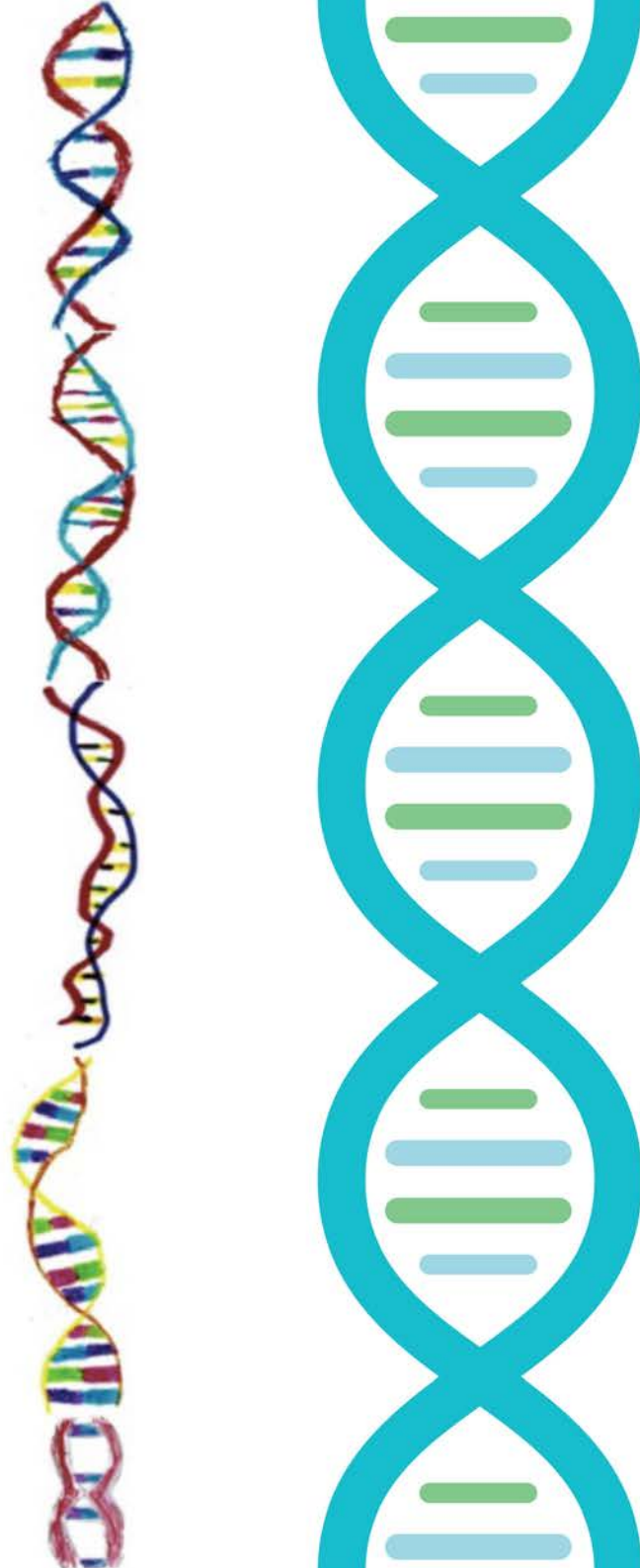

National Participant Panel

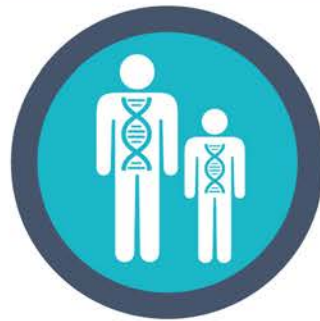
